Weekender Program Expands

Nourishing at-risk young children has been a priority of our Weekender Program since we opened our first program site in 2004. The program sends children, identified as coming from low-income families, home with a bag of nourishing non-perishable foods after-school on Fridays. The food is intended to keep the children fed over the weekend, a time where they go without the breakfasts and lunches provided by their schools. Keeping properly nourished over the weekend allows the children to return to school on Monday feeling healthy, energized and ready to learn.

The 2020-21 school year severely limited our ability to serve these children as most were learning remotely. Many of the 18 school sites we served (which represented about 1,200 children weekly) pre-pandemic went on hiatus.

However, as the children returned to school for the 2021-22 school year, our Programs Department worked diligently to make the program stronger than ever. These determined efforts have continued into the current school year. Today, Helping Harvest distributes Weekender bags at 70 school sites (primarily elementary schools) in Berks and Schuylkill counties.



As one of the focus areas of our recently

completed strategic plan, we have sought to expand the program to serve the youngest of children, before they enter the public school system, during what is considered the peak brain development years (in utero to age eight). To accomplish this, our Programs Department has secured partnerships with area day cares, Head Starts, and intermediate units to send these bags of food home with younger children.

In total, the Weekender Program is now nourishing nearly 5,000 children weekly.

The impact this program is having on the children, their families and their schools is immeasurable. It is our mission to sustain and expand the Weekender in the school years to come. However, the program comes at quite the cost to Helping Harvest. We estimate each bag distributed (filled with foods we purchased) costs us about \$11. Weekly delivery costs only furthers that expense.

Helping Harvest to Distribute 10 Million Pounds in 2022 -

The need for food assistance across Berks and Schuylkill counties (and across the nation) has grown significantly in 2022 as families, who were already struggling, are now dealing with inflation's effects. By the end of this year, Helping Harvest expects we will have delivered more than 10 million pounds of food to the more than 320 charitable food programs we supply in our two counties.

This represents a steep increase from the 8.25 million pounds distributed in 2021, at which time we were starting to see a leveling from the heights of 2020's COVID impacted distributions (nearly 11 million pounds in 2020).



To keep up with this demand, we continue to make food purchases by the (multiple) truckloads. We anticipate we will purchase more than \$3 million of food by the time this year concludes. We are grateful for you, our loyal supporters, who have contributed throughout the year to allow us to keep up with this ongoing demand. Your future support will allow us to sustain these efforts to insure no one in our community needs to go to bed hungry.

We are also grateful for the new distribution partners who have joined our network this year to help us accomplish our mission of feeding the hungry.

Abundant Life Church, Birdsboro; Pine Grove Military Share Distribution, Schuylkill County; LGBT Center of Greater Reading; Community Evangelical Church, Sinking Spring; Help Net Ministries, Inc., Ashland; and Calvary Bible Fellowship, Sinking Spring, are just some of the agencies that have joined the fight to end hunger. Your support has also allowed us to open three new Mobile Market sites this year in Schuylkill County: Valley View, South Schuylkill and Ringtown.

Thank YOU for being a part of our response to the continued need in OUR community.

Cranksgiving Rolls Out the Support!

Costumed riders took to the road for the 9th Annual Cranksgiving food drive on October 29. This year's participants brought in 3,500 pounds of food, which included two huge containers filled with turkeys! Event sponsors contributed \$5,500 to donate to Helping Harvest, which is most welcome during our busiest time of year. Since its inception, Cranksgiving Berks County has contributed nearly 29,000 pounds - almost 15 tons of food - to Helping Harvest.

A GIANT Help in Fighting Hunger

We would like to recognize our friends at The GIANT Company for their amazing contributions in the fight against hunger. To help us prepare for the Thanksgiving holiday, GIANT donated 500 turkeys and 500 chickens to Helping Harvest to be distributed to families in need throughout Berks and Schuylkill counties. GIANT employees who were present for the donation then stayed to volunteer in our warehouse, helping to pack emergency boxes for our neighbors in need.

GIANT's donation to Helping Harvest is part of a wider philanthropic effort. The company donated a total of 13,000 turkeys and chickens to community partners and food banks across Pennsylvania, Maryland, Virginia and West Virginia in advance of Thanksgiving.

GIANT's support in the fight against hunger is evident not just during the holidays, but throughout the year. Through the years, more than \$1,000,000 has been raised to support our combined causes. Our busy holiday season is upon us, and Helping Harvest volunteers have been hard at work for several weeks, donating their valuable free time to help us prepare. We have seen a dramatic increase in need for food assistance over the past several months, and adjusted our preparations accordingly. This year, we ordered enough food to pack 6,000 Thanksgiving boxes to distribute with turkeys and 6,000 holiday boxes to distribute in December with hams. In total, we will serve holiday meals to one thousand more families in Berks and Schuylkill counties than last year.
