Need increases with reduction of SNAP benefits

In March 2020, Congress increased monthly SNAP (food stamps) benefits with emergency allotments to help low-income families. The intention of this increase in benefits was to help these already struggling families as they coped with the economic impact of the COVID-19 pandemic. On a statewide average, these additional benefits averaged \$181 per household. Locally, more than 85,000 individuals in Berks and Schuylkill counties receive monthly support through SNAP. The extra benefits these individuals were receiving became even more impactful as inflation sent costs skyrocketing beginning in early 2022 and wreaked havoc on the budgets of our neighbors in need.

Unfortunately, these emergency allotments ended in March 2023, and the drastic reduction in benefits has had a devastating impact on local families and seniors who were relying on this support to afford food. Many of these families and individuals are now in the dire situation of choosing to spend money on food, rent, medical bills or other essential expenses. To get help with the food assistance they need, many more have turned to the programs supported by Helping Harvest over the past couple months. We have seen the number of families and individuals waiting in line for food grow as much as 35% at some of our program sites.

In 2022, Helping Harvest distributed nearly \$15 million worth of food (in comparison that number was \$8.8 million in 2019). With the current rise in need, we once again expect to supply at least \$15 million in 2023.

As many of you will already know, the past six months have been very difficult ones for the seniors, families and children we serve at Helping Harvest. Not only has the price of food, gas and housing continued to rise for our clients, but the end of the supplemental food-stamp benefit that most of them have been using to help cover some of those costs over



the past few years has made their challenges even more severe.

The result? Our neighbors in Berks and Schuylkill Counties are coming to Helping Harvest with a greater level of need than ever before. We distributed \$8.5 million in food to clients through our agency partners over the past six months, a staggering increase of 47% when compared to the same period a year earlier. We remain in an historic crisis of food insecurity, and Helping Harvest needs your support to provide the food assistance that children, seniors and families need right now.

All that being said, the level of support we have received from supporters like you gives us hope that we will continue to work together to make sure that no one goes to bed hungry in Berks and Schuylkill Counties. Senior Food Box Program expands

This March, our Pennsylvania Senior Food Box Program enrollment grew to include more than 2,000 older adults in Berks and Schuylkill counties – our highest participant number to date. We are so grateful for our volunteers, like Jim (pictured), who help pack and/or distribute the monthly boxes, and for those who assist at the 101 partner sites throughout our two counties where the boxes are distributed. We could not serve our seniors in need without you!

What is the Senior Food Box Program? The Senior Food Box Program works to improve the health of low-income seniors by supplementing their diets with nutritious foods. Helping Harvest receives the food each month for this federally-supported program through the USDA. Once received at Helping Harvest, as many as 40 volunteers help us pack the food into the 2,000+ boxes. The boxes are delivered by Helping Harvest drivers over the following weeks to our partner sites for distribution to the enrolled seniors. The intention of the Senior Food Box is to provide foods of high nutritional value to help bolster the health of the enrolled low-income seniors and to offset the costs of their limited food budgets.



Helping Harvest awarded Nonprofit of the Year by Schuylkill Chamber

Helping Harvest was proud to accept the 2023 Nonprofit of the Year Award from the Schuylkill Chamber of Commerce on May 5 at Mountain Valley Golf Course. This award is a recognition

of our organization's hard work to increase food distribution to better serve our neighbors in need in Schuylkill County.

Prior to 2020, Helping Harvest distributed approximately 1 million pounds of food annually to about 100 programs in Schuylkill County, including pantries, Weekender Program school sites, senior housing facilities (for the PA Senior Food Box Program and Produce Plus) and Mobile Markets. In 2022, we distributed 2.4 million pounds of food to 137 charitable food assistance programs. Food provided by Helping Harvest nourishes more than 29,000 low-income residents of Schuylkill County each year.

We are so very grateful and humbled the Schuylkill Chamber has recognized our efforts to go above and beyond in addressing food insecurity in Schuylkill County.
